So, what do you think? Can we do this? There will be no "attendance taken" as this will just be between you and our Blessed Mother.


A thought that I read in one of Matthew Kelly's Books:





My Motif EUCHARIST AS A SOURCE OF VOCATIONS

motif is a repeated narrative element that supports the theme of a story. In a movie, a motif can be presented in several ways: objects, sounds, dialogue, music, colors, and symbols. For instance, the color red in Schindler's List symbolizes the massacre of innocence. The spinning of the top in Inception represents the protagonist's grasp of reality. The Lord of the Rings has a ring that was forged on Mount Doom which represents the worldly temptations of power and pride. In my so-called life-movie, the motif that reappears in every scene of my life is the Eucharist, as it should be for all Catholics.

Much like in a movie, one must be intentional in looking for these signs to ascertain the deeper meaning of their own story. If we can train the eyes of our hearts to seek the spiritual signs in our own lives, we will arrive at a deeper understanding of our narrative but, more importantly, a deeper relationship with the source and summit of our faith.

From the very start of my discernment to the nights leading up to my ordination, I found myself constantly returning to the source, the Eucharist. If a single thread connected all the tapestries in my life, it would be the Eucharist: the body, blood, soul, and divinity of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Early in my faith journey, my approach to the Eucharist was solely a theological venture. The Eucharist was a mystery that remained unsolved, and I desired to understand its nature. Little did I know what started as a theological inquiry would later become a love and relationship that I cannot live without. The Eucharist hooked me from the conceptual and recled me into the relational. Our Lord is not an idea to be figured out; our Lord in the Eucharist is someone to encounter. As he presents himself in the Eucharist, we adore him, and in the presence of our King, we become adorned by his infinite love and grace.

Throughout my discernment period, I thought I was trying to seek him, but he sought me first. He fought for me when I did not deserve saving. He took up his cross because he loves the Father and wants us to return to our rightful home. At the Last Supper, Jesus instructs his disciples to remain in him. As baptized members of the Church, we are grafted to the true vine. We receive the necessary nutrients that keep us fully alive. If we remain in him, we will never hunger, and we will never thirst because he is true food and true drink.

But we become impatient and tend to venture off. We go the distance to "find" ourselves by taking on different jobs, earning various degrees and certificates, and traveling the world to find meaning. The answer that we sought was never far. In Christ we find clarity while we navigate a world that has become very much murky. Who better to ask about your vocation and purpose than the one who knitted you into existence, the author of all life, the God of all creation?

He makes himself readily present in the humble forms of bread and wine at every Mass all around the world and at all times of the day and night. He awaits your presence as he remains in his presence at the sacred liturgy and during the many hours of adoration. He is here to remain; are you willing to remain in him? May the Eucharist be your motif in your movie version of life.
