#### **SPEAKER**



It is always special to have one of our members be the featured speaker at our Serra Club. Sister Nadine chose to speak on St. Therese because it was her dad's favorite saint, and conveniently, October 1, just happened to be the day Sister Nadine spoke to us, and it was the Feast Day of St. Therese of the Child Jesus, Virgin, and Doctor of the Church. Saint Therese was French. She died at the young age of 24; however, she had a huge influence on the Catholic Church during her short lifetime.

From a very young age, she wanted to enter the convent. Her dad said that she was too young. He took her and her sister to Rome. She walked right up to the Pope and asked if she could enter the convent. The Pope referred her to her local Bishop who gave permission for Therese to become a nun. At age 15, Therese became a Carmelite cloister. At her novitiate ceremony, Therese became Sister Therese of the Child Jesus of the Holy Face. Her name kept her in close contact with God the Father and the Son. All through her life she focused on the Son. She wanted to help us to refresh the Face of Jesus each day of our lives. Therese asked in her prayers, what is the Face of Jesus today? Does He have a happy face or a sad face?

Therese wrote a document after she took the habit in 1889 with the purpose of an opportunity for others to sharpen and to increase devotion to Jesus. At an annual retreat, a Franciscan priest focused the retreat on talking to Jesus and the way Jesus speaks to us, rather than trying to be perfect through self-sacrifice. This priest focused on the gospels. What is each gospel telling me about my life today? Therese decided that she would take the message from the retreat to all the sisters to help them feel better. This retreat changed her life through the gospels where she gained an inner peace.

In 1893, her older sister became the new Prioress who chose Therese to be the Spiritual Director to the novices because she displayed a very special love for God and for each other.

At 22, Therese adopted the White Fathers from Belgium who were farmers and went around the world teaching in the missions. Therese was chosen to pray for the missions. It gave the priests some opportunity to work with Therese. The priests had been looking for a companion. She counseled them, encouraged them, praised them, and answered their questions. Therese of Lisieux is one of the patron saints of the missions, not because she ever went anywhere, but because of her special love of the missions, and the prayers and letters she gave in support of the missionaries. This is reminder to all of us who feel we can do nothing that it is the little things that keep God's kingdom growing. Here she was teaching the priests, and people had thought of her as a simple girl. She did not want to take her final vows because she would tell the other sisters that she was new at the convent.

Therese contacted tuberculosis, and suffered greatly coughing up blood. She received an invitation from a second group of priests to come to Africa to work in the mission field. She had to say no because she was dying. Therese's father named her the Little Flower.

Sisters were very hard on each other. When Therese died, no one thought she was very special. Therese had written down her daily activities on how she lived her life. Her sister rewrote the book on her specialness. She was very special. She portrayed two different images. One emphasized the hardships of convent life, and the other is her style of loving was being patient. She helped people to love the way Jesus loved. Therese looked into the Face of Jesus.

The Entrance Antiphon of her feast day reads: The Lord led her and taught her, and kept her as the apple of his eye. Like an eagle spreading its wings he took her up and bore her on His shoulders. The Lord alone was her guide.

Therese integrated her daily life into each day's gospel. How was Jesus going to say, "I love you?" How was Jesus going to communicate His message to us? Her love for Jesus was so profound. She felt Jesus was protecting her and holding her up. She suggested that we look at each day's gospel to find the message that God has for us. Jesus cured the sick. We are to help the sick. Say to them that the kingdom of God is so close to you. We need to help people we know and those that we don't know. Whatever good we do for others will always come back to us. We need to focus on prayers from the daily gospel. Praying this way gets the message that Jesus has for us each day. Therese wrote, "Kindness

is my only guiding star. In its light, I sail a straight route. I have my motto written on my sail: To live in love." St. Therese of Lisieux pray for us.
