

SPEAKER



On November 5, our Serra Club welcomed Father Nicolaus Thai as our guest speaker. He divided his presentation into two distinct parts. Beginning with a brief summary of his personal background, he then transitioned to his approach on his faith, society and culture.

Father Nicolaus aspired to have a career in Medical Physics and was working towards applying for the Ph.D. program at Purdue University when the Lord called him into the priesthood. He studied for the priesthood at St. Patrick's Seminary in Menlo Park, CA. Father Nicolaus was selected for further study in Rome at the North American College.

Grounded deeply in a scientific background, Father Nicolaus had a strong desire to make sense of his own reasoning process. He always looks at things from an outside perspective asking himself how would "this" resonate with Common Joe.

As the pandemic affected every individual, Father Nicolaus was no exception. As a person and as a priest, he faced tough questions. How do I approach my faith without any parishioners attending Mass or holding large gatherings? How do I bring Easter to our parishioners in a meaningful way online? What is the physical impact on the spiritually deprived parishioners?

Father Nicolaus developed a strict pandemic game plan for himself. He starts his day with his prayer book and a cup of coffee. We worry because we are faithful to the Lord day by day. Things may not go as planned, but we stay grounded in the Lord. We pray with our mind and our mouth. God is everywhere, in our mind, heart, and in our mouths. The virtual Mass is not perfect, but this is what we have now. The way we celebrate Mass is to help parishioners to open their heart and spiritually receive Holy Communion. However, our intellectual formation is our personal responsibility. suggests that we read some good books to nourish and expand our minds. Reading something academically or spiritually is good for our intellectual spirituality. He reads a book a month. For his physical exercise, he walks around the house often, and he likes to play basketball. Father Nicolaus keeps his life simple so that his game plan works perfectly with the one that supports God's plan.

After dinner at 5 pm, Father processes his emails, reaches out to his friends, and reads good books. This month he is reading a book on Purgatory. By bedtime, he puts all the components of his day together by reciting the Rosary and praising God in Adoration.

Father Nicolaus discussed the big wind we had recently that literally blew away the overhead tents we had been using for our outdoor Masses. For a short while we were permitted to have 100 people enjoy Mass indoors; however, we are now back to no indoor Masses.

Father suggested that we offer everything up for the repose of the poor souls in Purgatory. Each of us has our own cross to bear. He reminded us of the vine and the branches. Jesus is the vine and we are the branches. Father Nicolaus closed his presentation summarizing what he does in any given day. We have real events happening all around us, but we have Jesus as our anchor. Very often, Father takes note of how he lives his life day by day knowing that one day he will be called home to give an accounting of how he lived his life. The world will pass away, but God's kingdom will not pass away. We need to grow in faith, love and hope. We have a predestined life. When we face our Maker, Father Nicolaus wants to hear us say, "God, I tried my best."
