


The most recent grants from the fund were to St. John's Seminary, Bishop White Seminary and the Diocese of Orange Vocations Office.

SPEAKER



The old adage, "What we plan for ourselves isn't always what life has planned for us," might well describe Deacon Tony Patronite's journey which led him to become a deacon.

Deacon Tony explained that it all starts with Baptism. At the rite of Baptism there is an anointing which is as follows: "God the Father has freed you from sin, given you a new birth by water and the Holy Spirit, and welcomed you into His holy people. He now anoints you with the chrism of salvation." We are anointed at Baptism and called out to live out our baptismal call as Priest, Prophet and King. Our calling is to be there for people. As prophets we bring God's words. We have a humble kingship as humble prophets.

Deacon Tony was baptized in Ohio in 1947. He felt he was always inclined to be religious. In fact, Religion was the only subject in which he would receive A's! His father owned a store which was right next door to a convent and Deacon Tony really admired the nuns. He knows he did not inherit this zeal for religion as his mother was not Catholic and his father was a lukewarm Catholic. Although he and his 5 siblings would attend daily Mass, they never went together as a family. Deacon Tony attended Catholic elementary and high school and remembers his 3rd grade teacher (a nun) was very influential in his religious upbringing. He recalls that while his friends would go to the drug store across the street, he would head off to Church instead.

Although he went to high school as a practicing Catholic, he felt he needed more. He married a nice Catholic girl, but he still needed more, so he became a Catechist. He remembers clearly that on August 27, 1977, he was invited to a "Christ Renews His Parish" event at his church. In his head he was going to be a "no show" until his pastor called him last minute and said that if there were not at least 8 in

attendance, the event would be canceled. He remembers his 7 year old daughter commented that day that he left alone but returned with Jesus. He felt his life change at the confessional. It was different...face-to-face. (Deacon Tony chuckled as he admitted that he would previously go to Confession with a Hungarian priest, so that his sins would not be understood). Now he felt relaxed and lifted. He was grateful that God forgave his sins.

Years later the company where Deacon Tony was employed asked him to relocate and to that town he brought the "Christ Renews His Parish" event. Imitating what is good and effective, he saw other churches in the area bring the event to their parishes as well. The year 2000 was one that welcomed Deacon Tony to California when he moved to Irvine and became a parishioner of St. Thomas More Church. The pastor at the time, Fr. John Jantze, welcomed the idea of "Christ Renews His Parish" and it has been growing ever since. Fr. John Jantze would often ask Deacon Tony to become deacon, but Deacon Tony did not feel the calling at the time. However, Deacon Tony's wife, Mary, felt this was a good idea and when Fr. John asked again, Mary answered for him and in 2007 he was ordained a deacon!

In spite of his youthful looks, Deacon Tony will need to retire upon reaching his 75th birthday, yet Fr. Eugene Lee (present pastor at St. Thomas More) has asked him to continue leading the "Christ Renews His Parish" event. He has enjoyed everything he has been asked to do for the Church.

He feels these months since ordination have been an amazing and humbling experience to confer the Sacraments to the faithful. May we continue to pray for more vocations to the priesthood.
