PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



May is upon us. We see that the thread of vocations runs throughout this month.

Sometimes the World Day of Prayer for Vocations is in May. This year it is at the very end of April. As we pray for all vocations on that day, we see that religious brothers have their very own day in May. Religious Brothers Day falls on May 1 - the Feast of St. Joseph the Worker - every year. It is a relatively new celebration, established in 2017 in the United States. It also has expanded to be currently celebrated in Ireland, England, Australia and Canada.



May is the month of Mary. In his 1992 exhortation "Pastores Dabo Vobis" (I Shall Give You Shepherds), St. Pope John Paul II explains why Mary is the model for the priestly vocation:

"Every aspect of priestly formation can be referred to Mary, the human being who has responded better than any other to God's call. Mary became both the servant and the disciple of the Word to the point of conceiving, in her heart and in her flesh, the Word made man, so as to give him to mankind. Mary was called to educate the one Eternal Priest, who became docile and subject to her motherly authority. With her example and intercession, the Blessed Virgin keeps vigilant watch over the growth of vocations and priestly life in the Church."

Finally, May is Monsignor Sammon month. Each year we dedicate this month to requests for donations to the Monsignor Sammon Fund. The purpose of the Fund is to advance and support vocations to the Roman Catholic priesthood and the religious life, and in particular for the support of seminarians of the Diocese of Orange. The most recent grants from the fund were to St. John's Seminary, Bishop White Seminary and the Diocese of Orange Vocations Office. Any amount is appreciated. Let us give in memory of our beloved former chaplain and our everlasting inspiration, Msgr. John F. Sammon.

SPEAKER



The luck of the Irish can manifest itself in many ways and for our March meeting we had the unprecedented pleasure of welcoming Fr. Gaston Mendiola, Parochial Vicar at La Purisima. His charm and cheerful manner made it clear to the Serrans as to why he is so loved at his parish. Fr. Gaston's search for truth is what brought him to the priesthood.

Born in Veracruz, Mexico, Fr. Gaston is the middle child of three siblings. Although he was baptized in the Catholic Church as a baby, his parents later became Jehovah's Witnesses. As Jehovah's Witnesses, young Gaston observed that they were being taught to talk but not to hear. At 14 years of age he wanted the truth and realized he was a failure as a Jehovah's Witness. While still in school, 15year-old seminarians would visit his town for their mission work and their testimony made him want to be like them, except he liked the work but not the study. Therefore, unbeknownst to his parents, he began attending Catechism classes after school and the Bishop secretly gave him his sacraments.

At the age of 16, Gaston and his family moved to Chihuahua, close to the Texas border. They soon immigrated to the U.S. to work in the fields, cleaning houses and working in factories. For Gaston, the call to serve God still continued. While working in Mexicali at a Rehab Center run by Catholic Missionaries, Gaston was invited to become a priest. His endeavor was to become a lay brother, much like St. Martin de Porres, as he really did not want to study! However, the Bishop insisted and was able to convince him to attend a retreat. At the retreat, Gaston asked for a sign, and as he had a special devotion to Our Lady of Carmel, the sign manifested itself in the homily which the priest gave that day of the Brown Scapular and Our Lady of Carmel. In his heart, he felt that was the sign. As studying was his biggest cross to bear, he accepted God's will and like St. Joseph of Cupertino, he was reluctant to study but thankfully passed all his exams after six years in the Mexicali seminary. Bishop Vann asked him to come to Orange County where in 2018 Fr. Gaston was ordained at St. Vincent de Paul in Huntington Beach where he remained for four years as Parochial Vicar.

I conclude this article with a kicker...Yes, she fought hard, but eventually Fr. Gaston's mother did come to understand that the Catholic Church was started by Christ (although she did not like it), but she was truly moved upon listening to Bishop Vann speak of the Immaculate Conception and she followed by going to Confession. His father is very devoted to the Blessed Mother and prays the Rosary twice daily. Fr. Gaston reminds us to pray for our bishops and seminarians, especially for Hispanic seminarians, as there is great need for more.

We welcome our new member Margot Ang





I asked what's the requirement of being a member and she said, you just have to attend a monthly mass meeting to foster vocations and adopt a seminarian, pray and support them. One Sunday, I met Bishop Tim Freyer and he heard that I was joining the club. He said I was a perfect match for Serra club and he assured me that I would enjoy it. He also said that his mother enjoyed being a member for a long time.
