

SPEAKER



Father Erialdo Ramirez Alfaro, our September Speaker, is 35 years old. He has been a priest for 5 years serving first at St. Cecilia's in Tustin and presently as Parochial Vicar at St. Norbert's in Orange.

A question for you: What is time? We all know what it is till we are asked to tell someone what it is. Even more difficult: What is God's time? Eternity. Eternity is ALL "time" in one present moment. No past. No future. Only one total present moment. At our September gathering Fr. Erialdo gave us the Liturgy of the Word and his personal testimony ALL together in the one present moment. The result was a preaching both touching and instructive. Readings for that day, September 5, 2024, were the Gospel from Luke 5:1-11; the Responsorial Psalm 24; and the reading from First Corinthians 3:18-23. With the crowds pressing in on Him and while Simon, Andrew, James, and John were about their daily duties, Jesus singles out Simon. Uninvited, Jesus gets into Simon's boat. He asks Simon to push away from the crowds. He sits down and begins to teach. Are you listening?

Jesus got into Fr. Erialdo's "boat" when Father was very young. Jesus sat down and began to teach the young Erialdo, who was bored by his daily duties of assisting his mother in her dental practice. At the age of 12, Fr. Erialdo fell in love with the Word of God and with the stories told to him by a mother-of-a-friend about Missionaries in Africa. Those stories and the love of God's Word started a fire in Erialdo's heart. He desired to be a Missionary of the Gospel in Africa. Then Jesus commanded Erialdo take his boat

out into the deep waters. The deep was rough waters. He was battered by the discouraging waves of Mother, Father, Aunts, Uncles, and Cousins, who did NOT want Erialdo to become a priest. Erialdo's family were all dentists. Erialdo Ramirez Alfaro's future was set. He was to be a dentist. Even that mother-of-afriend who planted that seed of missionary zeal was discouraging. She said Africa was very hard and not a place he should aspire to work. Only his Grandparents were supportive.

In spite of all the opposition, in 2007 at the age of 18, Erialdo entered the seminary in Guadalajara, Mexico, where he earned the equivalent of a Master's Degree in philosophy. The waters were still deep and rough. No mission to Africa. Instead, a mission to the United States. His Bishop in Mexico sent then Seminarian Erialdo to Saint Joseph's Seminary in New York where he studied English and completed 3 years of Theology. Erialdo was protected in the rough waters by his boat and guided by his navigator, Jesus. Father told us there are times he is "melancholy" that Africa is not his mission field. But as the Responsorial Psalm 24 says "To the Lord belongs the earth and all that fills it." Father has surrendered all to Jesus. Father has left everything to follow Jesus. And Jesus said "Do not be afraid, from now on you will be catching men."

Our own Bishop Vann has recently added to Father Erialdo's responsibilities. In addition to his duties as Parochial Vicar at St Norbert's Parish, the Bishop has asked Father Erialdo to work within the Hispanic Community to help more Hispanic Men to hear and to respond to the call of Jesus. Men who will put out into deep water and who will lower their nets for a catch. Hispanic Men who will fear not and will become Ministerial Priests in our Diocese of Orange, CA. We wish Father much success with his mission and ask Jesus to keep Father Erialdo close to His Heart, and to bless him abundantly both in time and in eternity.
